

MSDG Programme Evaluation 2016/17

- 204 attendees at events during 2016/17, compared to 181 last year.
- 46 responses to SurveyMonkey email, compared to 23 in 2015/16.

Action: This equates to about 22.5% of attendees replying to the end of year evaluation compared to 12% last year. We will try to increase this further by polling for feedback twice in the year rather than asking some delegates to feedback almost 1 year after attending.

We will continue to explain to attendees how we evaluate events so they will expect to get asked about their experience after the event as well as taking feedback on the day.

Q1, Has what you learned at a Mercian Staff Development event influenced how you work?

69% said yes, compared to 78% last year.

Comments:

- It has encouraged me to think more broadly about the types of data I gather/ how I gather it.
- It has influenced my ideas on community/student involvement, widening participation and collection management
- Considerations with managing research data
- Although I haven't directly used what I learnt, yet, my understanding of this area of work has increased. I may use some of the techniques for a project I will be involved in next year
- As we are looking at replacing our LMS the experiences of the Northampton team came is useful when writing out requirements
- We are currently gathering information from other departments to allow us to write to publishers
- I'm not directly involved in space design
- There were some good ideas which I passed on in my report to management, but none, as yet, have been implemented.
- I've said no, but we are at so early a stage in developing workflows 'at the coal face' as opposed to the policy level there is not much to influence! Certainly provided food for thought though.
- Yes has made me think about different ways of obtaining customer feedback (ethnographies session). Thinking about how we can introduce these in the coming year.
- I had just started working in a Library environment so learned about my job in general. I also discussed public engagement and Widening Participation initiatives, which gave me ideas when I designed a Library Tour for school visits.
- It's given me ideas to consider when planning. It's helpful to know what other organisations are doing and that we have similar issues to address.
- As an attendee it was useful to network with colleagues in other libraries, see a different library set-up and share notes/good practice. As an organizer of an event it was a similar experience, also giving us an opportunity to showcase our new building and make links/connections with other University's library developments.
- Using other people's examples of 'best practice' and using the best bits

- I took stock of delegate comments as part of our work on RDM currently going on at my own institution.
- I appreciated that people in similar roles had similar issues - and for some their role was more difficult!
- Our Library is very different , but it was great to say how things are at Bham
- I have fed back information to my Supervising Librarians, but I'm not in a position to change working practices!
- Gaining ideas for improvement in our own library by seeing what other libraries do for similar tasks and customer service.
- Yes I've shared it with colleagues and SMT as examples of good practice at other Universities.
- It has made me more aware of assessing students starting point in terms of their information literacy understanding before offering support with inquiries.
- We reviewed our timeline of support for 1st year students with a particular focus on induction, Week 6 (study skills) and February after exam results
- I have used what I learned to influence a university-wide induction planning group
- We are going to set up a group of staff to look at our Induction Week events and use some of the ideas from the event.
- Given me ideas to take back to my own Institution to see how they might be adapted to fit and being able to listen to what has and hasn't worked for others
- Fed into institutional induction project
- Pulling together a menu of support options to take to academics
- We decided to do radical overhaul of our induction activity for the future.
- Wrote up the notes and then had a knowledge cafe with other subject librarians to share ideas and experiences
- The ethnography event gave us some ideas for how we might use it to improve our own service.
- Planning for services to Collaborative Partners

Q2, Have you remained in contact with anyone you met at an event?

39% have kept in touch, compared to 22% last year; perhaps underlining the valuable networking opportunities MSDG events provide to different groups of operational staff.

Comments:

- Yes, but not specifically in relation to attending the event
- I followed up with another attendee for advice on reporting
- Via LIS-PERL list which I joined subsequently having heard about it at the event
- Yes and no. Know lots of people there so not got in touch specifically about this but would if I needed to

Q3, Have you or would you attend another event or recommend an MSDG event to others?

100% of attendees want to attend more and would recommend to others.

Comments:

- Great environment for sharing ideas, lots of insight into real-life examples of use of different engagement techniques.
- It's useful to see how other libraries have overcome common problems plus compare career paths. It is interesting to compare scale between smaller and larger institutions
- Excellent networking opportunities. Also good for finding out what others are doing and for showcasing our own work
